The Old Order (Slowly) Changeth...

I was on the phone the other day with that wise but not so old owl, Rob.Legg. Amongst a number of other issues, we discussed matters RL24 (fancy that!) The subject of the longevity of the RL24 Association crept into the conversation and I ventured that it may have a lot to do with a group of discerning people coalescing around an object that represents extraordinary virtue in all its aspects. An RL24 is both the Mona Lisa and the pure bred kelpie of the trailable yacht genre. There is no other boat that works as well or looks as good, kilo for kilo, in the world. The ever-modest Rob, for his part, took the view that the success of the Association has more to do with the attitude and the calibre of the people doing the coalescing rather than the object of their sailing desires. After some more chit chat, we rang off but a little later, I had some news that caused me to reflect again and appreciate the wisdom of Rob's point. Our Hon. Secretary, Jane Davis left word that Graham McDonald, a foundation member of our Association, was retiring from the Association 35 years after he joined in 1974. Graham (and his wife Jenny) purchased Solitaire (Sail # 25) from Rob. as a bare hull/deck combination and fitted her out at home. She has been in their hands ever since. She started life as a swing keeler (as they all did in those days) but as an astute and keen developer and experimenter rather than a racer, Graham was soon tinkering with the rig. He was one of the first to move to a fixed rather than rotating mast set-up after which he turned his attention to the keel. To facilitate his interest in this regard, he went to the trouble of constructing a pit in his workshop and modifying his trailer to make it easy to remove the fin and replace it at will. He was one of the first, if not the first, to play with bulb keels and he certainly had many others of varying lengths and weights, all of which he made in their entirety. Graham's particular sailing interest was cruising the Gippsland Lakes which he happily did frequently, in all weathers and, to the consternation of his friends, alone. We needn't have worried. Solitaire had been superbly set up for this sort of sailing and after a long career in and around the Royal Australian Navy, Graham was a most accomplished seaman. But cruising wasn't the only string to Solitaire's bow. Her racing potential had not been overlooked and in the hands of Graham's eldest son, Jamie (of 14ft and 16ft skiff fame), she finished 3rd. in the Nationals at Rhyll in 1995 and won or was highly place in open fleet races around Port Phillip.


